Productive Employees

When working parents have access to affordable, safe, reliable child care, their *ability to be productive employees* is greatly enhanced!

A sampling of data collected from a 2016 Pilot Survey of Upstate New York Parents across eight economic regions, conducted by the Early Care & Learning Council's (ECLC) network of Child Care Resource & Referral (CCR&R) agencies, showed that the annual cost of child care places a significant strain on family budgets and *impacts their employment readiness*.


